

# The Home Improvement Guaranty Fund

compensate homeowners for monetary losses resulting from unworkmanlike or incomplete work by licensed contractors. The Guaranty Fund may pay up to \$20,000 per individual claim, and the total amount of all claims paid against a single contractor may not exceed \$100,000.
